Native Perennial Flowers



Cardinal Flower

\$4.50 per plantlet

Beautiful brilliant red trumpet shaped flowers are a favorite of hummingbirds and serve as a great pond or stream-side flower. Sold individually as a plantlet. Reaches a height of 24-36 inches on average, bloom in the mid to late summer.

Moderately Deer resistant



White Blazing Star

10 dormant corms for \$5

A variation of the common purple blooms, these are likewise a powerhouse of nectar and pollen very well loved by many pollinators.

Sold as dormant corms which bloom in the late summer. Prefer well drained soils and full sun. Deer resistant!



Purple Blazing Star

10 dormant corms for \$5

These dense clusters of flowery spikes are abundant in pollen and nectar for butterflies, bees, and other important pollinators. Prefers well drained soils and can withstand drought conditions well, thrives in full sun. Blooms in late summer, seeds are loved by birds in the fall. Deer resistant!

Conifers

Norway Spruce - bare root, 12-18 inch seedling



Norway Spruce trees support a wide variety of wildlife. They are important as winter cover for deer and small game including grouse, rabbits, and woodcock. Norways also makes a good roosting tree for hawks and owls. **These are resistant to the Cytospora canker afflicting Blue Spruce trees.** They are also very beneficial as privacy barriers and wind breaks. At full maturity, reaches a height of 40-60 feet with a spread of 25-30 feet. Requires full sun and prefers well drained areas.



White Spruce - bare root, 12-18 inch seedlings



With a similar growth pattern as the Norway Spruce, this tree is an excellent, **deer-resistant** replacement for the much loved Colorado Blue Spruce. It has blue green needles and **is immune to the Cytospora canker which is known to kill Blue Spruce.** Requires full sun, well drained soil, but does well in wetter areas too. This tree is superb habitat for many birds as a nesting and feeding site. It also offers food for many small mammals.



European Larch - bare root, 10-20 inch seedlings



Similar to the native Tamarack, this tree takes on brilliant yellow/orange needles in the fall. This tree does not however compete with the native Tamarack due to differing growing conditions. Rather than thriving in wet areas like our native Tamarack, European Larch needs well drained soil and full sun. It is however tolerant of intermittent flooding. The tree provides shelter and food for birds and small mammals.



Eastern Hemlock— bare root, 4-8 inch seedling



Hemlocks provide excellent cover for deer and songbirds. Prime nesting site for several warblers. Seeds are eaten by juncos, chickadees, and siskins . This tree is often found near streams and does well at wet sites or as a riparian buffer choice. Hemlocks are one of few trees that can tolerate both full sun and nearly full shade conditions. Hemlocks are also a favorite for privacy screens due to their handsome shape and graceful limbs. At full maturity, reaches a height of 40-70 feet, and a spread of 25-35 feet.



Hardwoods

Red Oak—bare root, 4-5 feet



A sturdy, fast-growing, handsome shade tree. At full maturity, reaches 60-70 feet tall with equal spread. Grows best in sandy to rich loam soils and in full sun. Acorns are bitter but eaten by deer and squirrels. Tolerant of urban conditions such as higher road salt. Very valuable as a timber tree. Beautiful red fall foliage!



Chinquapin Oak—bare root, 12-18 inches

A wildlife favorite for its abundant acorns, which are produced within 10-15 years of the tree's life! This oak does well in many different soils, but requires full sun. Reaches a height of 40-50 feet and a spread of 50-60 feet, making it a wonderful shade tree option. A popular member of the white oak family.



Serviceberry—bare root, 18-24 inches

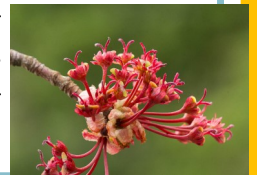


Among the first flowers of spring, serviceberry greatly benefits pollinators. It also provides great berries for birds, and lovely reddish gold foliage in the fall. The tree grows in a round shape, and reaches 15-25 feet in height, with equal spread, at full maturity. Grows best in well drained, acidic soils, with full to partial sunlight. Often found naturally in forested areas.



Red Maple - Containerized seedlings, 2-3 feet

One of the first trees to flower red clusters in the Spring, these are a favorite of hummingbirds and other pollinators. Red maples are also known for their beautiful fall foliage. These trees reach a height of 60 feet with a 40 foot spread at full maturity, and prefer well drained, moist soils with full sun conditions. These are larger, containerized trees, and are a little more of an investment, so we highly recommend protecting them with tree shelters!



A Note on "Containerized" Stock:

This year, the District sourced containerized trees from Octoraro Nursery. This means the trees have been grown in their pots, which provides optimum conditions for root development. Although this intense care for the trees makes them more expensive, it greatly improves the chance for survival over the typical bare root tree. Octoraro implements a number of other sustainable production methods that encourage superior root development including drip irrigation, "air-root-pruning" methods, and containers to produce stronger, healthier plants overall.

Shrubs

Gray Dogwood—bare root, 18-24 inches



This shrub is very adaptable, taking full sun or shade, and drier or wet areas. White flowers in the spring become unique white berries loved by many birds. This is considered a great plant to place near ponds and other wildlife sites. Grows 10-12 feet tall with a 12-15 foot spread.



American Elderberry—bare root, 24-36 inches



Vigorous, fast-growing shrub up to 10 feet in height. Bluish-black berries are excellent for jams, wine, and baking. Berries are also a great food source for birds and other wildlife, while pollinators benefit from the mid-summertime blooms. Does not prefer a certain soil or drainage, and is relatively wetland tolerant. Requires partial to full sun.



Spicebush—bare root, 24-36 inches



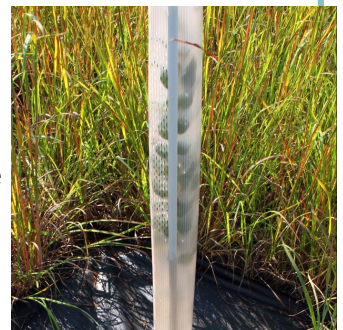
In the North this plant is thought of as the “forsythia of the wilds” because its early spring flowering gives a subtle yellow tinge to many lowland woods where it is common. An adaptable plant, but does well in moist, partial shade areas. The blooms are great for pollinators and fruits are loved by birds and wildlife. Larval host plant to the Eastern Tiger Swallowtail and the Spicebush Swallowtail butterflies. Grows to a height and spread of 12-15 feet.

Safeguard your investment in tree planting with shelters! Tree shelters ensure your young, vulnerable seedlings will not be browsed by deer or girdled by rodents, when installed properly. Tree shelters should only be used on shrubs and hardwood trees. Plantra shelters are partially vented to allow air flow, yet can help create a warmer environment overall and better growth conditions. These shelters also include bird netting that prevents birds from getting into the shelters and becoming trapped. Includes instructions, 3 Twist-Lock Double Wire Twist Ties & 1 Bird Exclusion Mesh Top Per Grow Tube. To cut cost, wooden garden stakes are sourced separately through our local hardware store, and are included with your Plantra tubes order.
